Happy New Year!

Welcome back to the first Spring Term of Year 6! We hope that you had a restful and enjoyable break with your families and that you enjoyed celebrating the New Year.

We are sure that this new term will be just as wonderful as the last one!



Our Topic: Light Fantastic

In English, our learning will be based around studing short films. We will be learning about the different elements of film and use this to support a range of writing activities, such as descriptive narratives, a non-chronological report and a voice over. We will be using the short films 'El Caminante', The Tale of the Three Brothers (linked to Harry Potter) and 'The Paino.'



Our whole class guided reading text for this half term is 'Impossible Creatures', by Katherine Rundell.

In Maths, we will continue to build upon our knowlegde of place value and the written methods for all four operations. We will also begin to look at fractions and calculating with fractions. This will include adding, subtracting and multiplying fractions and the division of fractions by whole numbers. We will also look at how to convert between fractions, decimals and percentages.

In Science, our topic is 'Light' and we will be looking at how humans can see. We will also cover reflection, refraction, recap how shadows are formed and why shadows change size.

In Geography, we will be learning about Earthquakes and Volcanoes. We will initially learn about the structure of the Earth to develop our understanding of how earthquakes and volcanoes occur and the effects that they have on the planet.



In Music, the children will be learning how to play the guitar with Mrs Horwood. Alongside this, also be developing their improvisation and composition skills.

In Computing, we are going to continue to use the Purple Mash scheme of work and will be learning about Quizzing and how to create interactive guizzes for different audiences.

In Art, we are going to be studying the work of Claude Monet by developing our painting skills using water colour. We will begin by mixing colours to create a colour wheel before creating our own piece of work in the style of Monet.



In R.E, we are going to be focusing on The Bible and begin to consider how The Bible originated themes and text-types covered within it.

In **French**, we will be revisiting our phonics and learning how to explain what we do at the weekends.

In **PE**, children will be playing hockey and also participating in dance and gymnastics lessons this half term.

In **P.S.H.E.**,. We will be continuing our 'Jigsaw' scheme of work, with our next unit 'Dreams and Goals'. This unit will give us the opportunity to set some personal goals and recognise the necessary steps that we need to take in order to achieve them.



We will be looking at the value of the month for January – 'Aspiration'.


The other value of the month for this half term is 'Equality', which will be our value for the month of February.

Key Stage Two SATs

The statutory assessments for Year 6 children across the country are scheduled to take place from Monday 12th May – Thursday 15th May.

On these days, the children will be taking part in Reading, Grammar and Punctuation, Spelling and Maths tests. Please ensure that your child is in school for these four days!

We will be holding our SATs Information Evening on Tuesday 14th January. During the meeting, we will be sharing information as to how to support your child in the run-up and during the SATs.

Reading at Home

We will be continuing to collect the children's Home-School Link books each Wednesday. The children need to be writing their own entry each time that they read, summarising what has happened in the section of text that they have read and which parts of the book they did and didn't enjoy reading.

While we are expecting the children to read at least three times per week, we would strongly encourage daily reading, where possible. The children can read their library books, reading books, newspapers, magazines or online articles.



'Spirit Walker' by Michelle Paver

While out hunting in the Forest, Torak encounters a man whose body and brain have been horrifying disease. When the illness spreads to his foster clan, the Ravens, he sets off for the distant alien land of the Seal Clan, where, it is rumoured, a cure can be found. Aided on his dangerous quest by his friend Renn and his pack brother, Wolf, Torak faces the deadly tokoroth - demon children - and betrayal by someone he trusts.

'Onyeka and the Academy of the Sun' by Tola Okogwu

Onyeka has a lot of hair - the kind that makes strangers stop in the street. 'Hero.com' and 'Villain.net' by Andy Briggs

Written by the same author, Andy Briggs has cleverly intertwined stories in different books to gain different perspectives. Imagine that you happen to come across a webpage that offers you a superpower. Which one would you select? How would it help you in your life? What you use it for good or bad? In Hero.com and villain.net you go on adventures where children do exactly that - discover that what they think is a game, actually becomes reality. If you like action-packed adventure, these books are for you. And the great news, there's a whole series of them to read through.

'The Windrush Child' by Benjamin Zephaniah

This story is all the more incredible as it is true. It revolves around a boy, Leonard, who travels to England from Jamaica. His head is full of questions: Why are we leaving? What will life be like in England? Will I make friends? The life he has been promised isn't the life he finds when he arrives in Southampton. This is a story of grit, resilience and self-confidence.

'The Treekeepers' by Kieran Larwood

An epic tale of trees of power and a world under threat, from the author of the bestselling Five Realms series. Here come the roots of the Shadow Tree. Whatever they touch will never get free. Liska lives in Arborven, a city surrounding an extraordinary tree that gives all those living there special powers. As a shapeshifter, Liska is training as a warrior. When she discovers that the Tree is under threat, it is her duty to act - but she can't convince anyone to listen to her.
